The International Conference of Data Protection Commissioners in Paris, and the D-G 13 Legal Advisory Board in Luxembourg, both of which I was privileged to attend as an observer, provided a wealth of information and insights so that reports will be spread over two issues. Also here, our first major feature on privacy in the USA; a completely updated directory of Data Protection Authorities; and the provisional programme for our 1991 mid-summer annual conference in Cambridge.
