GREECE AND CZECHOSLOVAKIA

Provisional Commercial Agreement, signed at Athens, December 28, 1922\January 10, 1923.

No. 544. — PROVISIONAL COMMERCIAL AGREEMENT ² BETWEEN GREECE AND CZECHOSLOVAKIA, SIGNED AT ATHENS, DECEMBER 28, 1922/JANUARY 10, 1923.

French official text communicated by the Director of the Permanent Hellenic Secretariat accredited to the League of Nations. The registration of this Agreement took place January 2, 1924.

THE HELLENIC GOVERNMENT and THE CZECHOSLOVAK GOVERNMENT, desirous of improving, re-establishing and extending commercial relations between the two countries, have decided to conclude a Provisional Commercial Agreement.

For this purpose, the undersigned, duly authorised by their respective Governments, agreed

upon the following:

Article T.

In view of the fact that the importation into Czechoslovakia of certain Greek products is permitted only with the authorisation of the Czechoslovak Government, the latter undertakes to allow the importation into Czechoslovakia of the contingents enumerated in Annex A, which forms an integral part of the present Agreement. The annual contingents fixed in this list shall be divided into parts corresponding to the quarters of the year for which they are allowed, it being understood that if the amount imported during one quarter is less than one-fourth of the contingent the difference will be added to the contingent for the following quarter. The Greek products and goods enumerated in Annex A shall, on their entry into Czechoslovakia, benefit by the most-favoured-nation clause, including any advantages which are or may subsequently be conceded to similar articles from other countries, particularly as regards the reduction or abolition of existing co-efficients.

Article 2.

The Hellenic Government, on its part, undertakes to grant most-favoured-nation treatment, including all advantages which are or may subsequently be conceded by the Customs tariff fixed by treaty, to the Czechoslovak goods enumerated in Annex B, which forms an integral part of the present Agreement.

Article 3.

The Czechoslovak Government takes note of the abolition of the import restrictions formerly affecting Czechoslovak products. Should, however, the Greek Government desire subsequently

to place any import restrictions or prohibitions on one or more of the classes of goods enumerated in Annex B to the present Agreement, it undertakes to enter into negotiations with the Czechoslovak Government with a view to rendering such restrictions as little detrimental as possible to the Czechoslovak export trade.

Article 4.

The Czechoslovak Government undertakes that in purchasing cigarette tobacco for its own requirements its Tobacco Monopoly will give preference to Greek tobaccos as follows:

- (I) Up to 700,000 kgs. per annum to tobaccos from Old Greece and the Islands (Samos);
- (2) Up to 1,300,000 kgs. per annum to tobaccos from New Greece (Macedonia).

Provided always:

- (I) That it receives the offer of such tobaccos;
- (2) That this offer is made at prices and upon conditions which the Czechoslovak Tobacco Monopoly finds satisfactory as compared with the conditions offered for other tobaccos of which it might consider the purchase for the manufacture of Czechoslovak cigarettes.

The Greek Government, on its part, explicitly declares:

- (1) That 'Czechoslovak firms shall be free to make tenders for high-class playing cards and for matches upon the same conditions as other foreign firms;
- (2) That Greek tobacco merchants shall be free to purchase cigarette papers in Czechoslovakia upon the same conditions as in other countries.
- (3) That, should the importation of alcohol be permitted in Greece during a limited period, Czechoslovak importers shall be placed upon the same footing as all other importers.

Article 5.

The two contracting Parties may require products and goods imported into their territories to be accompanied by certificates of origin issued by Chambers of Commerce or other competent authorities.

Article 6.

The present Agreement shall be ratified and shall come into force fifteen days after the exchange of ratifications, which shall take place at Athens.

The Agreement shall remain binding for six months after the date on which it comes into force. After the expiry of this period, it shall automatically be extended without further notice, and shall remain in force for three months after the date of its denunciation by one of the contracting Parties.
