No. 1355. — DECLARATION ² BETWEEN ESTONIA AND SWEDEN REGARDING THE RECIPROCAL APPLICATION OF THE CONVENTION ³ CONCERNING CIVIL PROCEDURE CONCLUDED AT THE HAGUE JULY 17, 1905. SIGNED AT TALLINN, NOVEMBER 27, 1923.

French official text communicated by the Swedish and Estonian Ministers for Foreign Affairs. The registration of this Declaration took place November 4, 1926.

With a view to determining in regard to various matters the legal relations between THE KINGDOM OF SWEDEN and THE ESTONIAN REPUBLIC, the undersigned, duly authorised for this purpose by their respective Governments, have agreed to the following declaration :

The provisions of Articles 1 to 24 of the Convention concerning Civil Procedure, concluded between several Powers at The Hague on July 17, 1905, shall be applied in Sweden in favour of Estonia and Estonian nationals, and in Estonia in favour of Sweden and Swedish nationals.

The present Declaration shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged as soon as possible. The Agreement shall take effect as soon as the ratifications are exchanged. It shall remain in force until April 27, 1929. As from that date, it shall be renewed by tacit agreement every five years until denounced by one of the Parties. Denunciation must be notified at least six months before the expiry of the aforesaid periods.
