#### TRANSLATION — TRADUCTION

No. 435. FOURTH ADDITIONAL PROTOCOL¹ TO THE COM-MERCIAL AGREEMENT OF 21 FEBRUARY 1946 BE-TWEEN NORWAY AND THE BELGIUM-LUXEMBOURG ECONOMIC UNION. SIGNED AT BRUSSELS, ON 8 MARCH 1949

In accordance with the provisions of article IV of the Commercial Agreement of 21 February 1946, the Mixed Commission met at Brussels from 2 to 11 February 1949.

During the negotiations which then took place, the delegates of the Belgium-Luxembourg Economic Union and of Norway drew up schedules A and B annexed, setting forth the products to be exchanged between the two countries during the first half of 1949. In order to facilitate the uniform exhaustion of various quotas, they agreed that the Norwegian authorities should, as a rule, issue import licences for the goods listed in schedule B to the extent of 50 per cent before 31 March 1949 and the remaining 50 per cent before 30 June 1949.

As regards the quotas of chemical and mechanical wood-pulp in schedule A, the delegation representing the Belgium-Luxembourg Economic Union agreed to the renewal, for the second half of 1949, of the quotas provided for the first half of 1949.

It also informed the Norwegian delegation of its wish to see the treatment of copper matte and blister copper resumed in Belgium at the earliest possible date. The Norwegian delegation promised to refer the matter to its Government so that the Belgium Government's wishes could be met as far as possible.
