TRANSLATION — TRADUCTION

No. 460. AGREEMENT¹ CONCERNING THE EXCHANGE OF GOODS BETWEEN THE KINGDOM OF NORWAY AND THE REPUBLIC OF CZECHOSLOVAKIA. SIGNED AT PRAGUE, ON 20 MARCH 1947

The Royal Government of Norway and the Government of Czechoslovakia, having regard to the Commercial Agreement between Norway and the Republic of Czechoslovakia concluded on 2 October 1923,² and the Additional Agreement concluded on 26 June 1929³ and

Desirous of encouraging and extending commercial relations between the two countries, of maintaining their collaboration in the future and of thus contributing to the development of economic activity in general, have agreed to the following provisions:

Article 1

The schedules of goods A and B shall form an integral part of the present agreement.

Article 2

The Czechoslovak Government shall authorize the import, and the Royal Government of Norway shall authorize the export to Czechoslovakia, of the goods specified in schedule A, up to the quantities or values mentioned therein.

Article 3

The Royal Government of Norway shall authorize the import, and the Czechoslovak Government shall authorize the export to Norway, of the goods specified in schedule B up to the quantities or values mentioned therein.

Article 4

Should the possibility arise of a wider exchange of goods than that provided for in this agreement or should it appear, during the period in which the agreement is in force, that the balance of payments in respect of goods imported and exported in accordance with this agreement will not be achieved, the two Governments shall concert with each other for the purpose of expanding imports or exports as far as possible and consulting together with a view to

amending, supplementing or extending the schedules of goods, or taking any other appropriate measures.

Article 5

The two Governments agree, immediately upon the entry into force of any international multilateral convention on trade and employment to which the two countries are parties, to review if necessary the provisions of the present agreement with a view to adapting their undertakings in conformity with the said convention.

Article 6

Payments due by one country to the other pursuant to this agreement shall be made in accordance with the provisions of the "Monetary Government between the Royal Norwegian Government and the Government of the Czechoslovak Republic", signed at Oslo on 13 December 1945.

Article 7

For the purpose of supervising the carrying out of the provisions of the present agreement, a Joint Commission composed of representatives of the two countries shall meet as necessary with the aim of proposing jointly to their respective Governments amendments to or extensions of the present Agreement.

The Joint Commission shall meet at the request of either of the two countries submitted through the diplomatic channel and containing specific proposals with regard to the questions to be discussed.

Article 8

It is agreed that the special treatment afforded at present or which may be afforded in the future to deliveries made within the framework of the "United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration" (UNRRA) or to imports to Norway or Czechoslovakia of goods delivered as reparations shall not be claimed by the other Party in respect of its deliveries, in pursuance of the provisions of the aforementioned Commercial Agreement and the Additional Agreement, or of the present agreement.

Article 9

Subject to approval by the two Governments, this agreement shall be deemed to have come into force on 13 February 1947 and shall remain in force until 29 February 1948 and thereafter unless it is denounced after one month's prior notice.

PROTOCOL¹ CONCERNING THE EXCHANGE OF COMMODITIES
BETWEEN NORWAY AND CZECHOSLOVAKIA. SIGNED AT
PRAGUE, ON 28 JULY 1948

The Norwegian Government and the Czechoslovak Government, desirous of promoting the exchange of commodities between their two countries, have agreed to the following provisions:

- I. The Agreement concerning the exchange of goods between the Kingdom of Norway and the Republic of Czechoslovakia, signed at Prague on 20 March 1947, shall remain in force in accordance with article 9 of the said agreement until 28 February 1949 and thereafter, unless it is denounced after one month's prior notice. Nevertheless, schedules A and B annexed to the said agreement shall be replaced by schedules A and B annexed to the present protocol.
- II. The quantities or values of goods included in schedules A and B annexed to the Agreement concerning the exchange of goods between the Kingdom of Norway and the Republic of Czechoslovakia, signed at Prague on 20 March 1947, authorized for import into either country after 29 February 1948 in excess of the quantities or values specified in the said schedules, shall be reckoned against the quantities or values laid down for the same goods specified in schedules A and B annexed to the present protocol.
- III. The quotas of the schedules annexed to the Agreement concerning the exchange of goods between the Kingdom of Norway and the Republic of Czechoslovakia, signed at Prague on 20 March 1947, which are not exhausted by the import authorizations before 26 June 1948, shall no longer be used.
- IV. This protocol shall be put into force provisionally as from 26 June 1948 and shall come into force definitively on the date of its signature.
