Article I

(a) The Authorities in the US/UK Occupied Areas of Germany will use their best efforts to promote the exchange of goods between the US/UK Occupied Areas of Germany and Norway.

(b) The Authorities of the Royal Norwegian Government will use their best efforts to promote the exchange of goods between Norway and the US/UK Occupied Areas of Germany.

Article II

With a view to increasing trade between Norway and the US/UK Occupied Areas of Germany both sides agree to endeavour to restore normal business communications and to encourage contact between business representatives in order to re-establish trade relationships. Both sides will expedite the handling of goods, will grant the necessary documents to facilitate trade and will provide for payment in accordance with the terms of the separate Payments Agreement of this date.

Article III

The validity of contracts entered into during the term of this Protocol will not be affected by its expiration.

Article IV

The present Protocol shall become effective upon signature hereof and of the Payments Agreement by the Royal Norwegian Government and by

PROTOCOL¹ BETWEEN THE ROYAL NORWEGIAN GOVERNMENT AND MILITARY GOVERNMENTS FOR GERMANY (US/UK) COVERING TRADE AND PAYMENTS BETWEEN NORWAY AND THE US/UK OCCUPIED AREAS OF GERMANY. SIGNED AT BERLIN, ON 30 JULY 1948²

Moved by the desire to develop as far as possible trade and commerce between Norway and the US/UK Occupied Areas of Germany, the Royal Norwegian Government and Military Governments for Germany (US/UK) have agreed as follows:

Article I

(a) The Royal Norwegian Government will grant export licenses and Military Governments for Germany (US/UK) will grant import licenses or will otherwise arrange for the deliveries enumerated in the list attached hereto as Annexes A1 and A2, it being understood that this list is not exhaustive and may be enlarged at any time, to agree with changed circumstances.

(b) The Military Governments for Germany (US/UK) will grant export licenses and the Royal Norwegian Government will grant import licenses for the deliveries enumerated in the list attached hereto as Annex B, it being understood that this list is not exhaustive and may be enlarged at any time, to agree with changed circumstances.

(c) It is understood that the licenses and arrangements referred to in paragraphs (a) and (b) above are subject to the negotiation of contracts which are mutually satisfactory regarding specifications, prices, delivery and other items.

Article II

(a) The authorities in the US/UK Occupied Areas of Germany will use their best efforts to promote the exchange of goods and services between the US/UK Occupied Areas of Germany and Norway in accordance with the plan envisaged in Article I.

(b) The Royal Norwegian Government will use their best efforts to promote the exchange of goods and services between Norway and the US/UK Occupied Areas of Germany in accordance with the plan envisaged in article I.

Article III

The parties to this agreement will endeavour to encourage contact between business representatives in order to re-establish the normal exchange of goods and services and to expedite the handling of goods.

Article IV

Payments will be effected in accordance with the payments agreement between the parties hereto currently in force.

Article V

The present Protocol will provisionally come into force on 1 July 1948 and will formally take effect retroactively from that date as soon as it has been officially signed. It will remain in effect until 30 June 1949 and will, thereafter, be automatically renewed for a period of one year, unless three months' notice of termination is given by either party. If termination notice is not given, a mixed commission will meet in order to propose and to recommend to the Norwegian Government and to the Military Governments for Germany (US/UK) for their acceptance, lists of commodities to be exchanged between the two areas during the following year.

Article VI

This Protocol will supersede the Protocol covering trade between Norway and the US/UK Occupied Areas of Germany dated 19 September 1947.¹

1. Margarine or compound lard — The Bizone is interested to purchase substantial quantities but at present Norwegian prices are considered too high.

2. Rennet casein — The Bizone is interested in 200 tons but at present Norwegian prices are considered too high.

3. Rayon pulp (90-100) — The Bizone is interested in 17,000 tons and would like to receive offers from Norway.

4. Wallboard — The Bizone is interested in 1,000 tons hard wallboard which Norway is not at present prepared to sell without simultaneous sale of other qualities.

5. Graphite — The Bizone is interested in small quantities but at present Norwegian prices are considered too high.

6. Soeftestad ore — The Bizone is interested in 15,000 tons and Norway will investigate availability.

7. Tanker charter — The Bizone is interested to charter small sea-going and also inland tankers and would like to have offers from Norway.

ANNEX A2

Dear Mr. Koht:

In connection with the trade and payments discussions which have been taking place in Frankfurt between the Norwegian delegation and representatives of Military Governments for Germany (US/UK), it has become important that you be given some assurance as to the intentions of the Bizonal authorities regarding the purchase of fish from Norway.

The fish purchase program which has been adopted for the Fiscal Year 1 July 1948 to 30 June 1949 contemplates the procurement of approximately 200,000 tons of herring and white fish.

We recognize the suitability of Norwegian herrings for the German ration and, also, the great importance of fish exports in the Norwegian national economy, and it is the definite intention of the Bizonal food authorities to provide for the purchase of 115,000 tons of herring and 10,000 tons of white fish from Norway and to make arrangements for payments therefore either in U.S. dollars or by debits to the offset account established at the Norges Bank pursuant to Article II of the Payments Agreement dated 1 July 1948.

You, of course, will understand that actual procurement will in all cases depend upon the conclusion of specific contracts and that such contracts will, in turn, depend on agreement between the parties as to quality, price and delivery terms. According to our present plans most of our fish procurement will take place in the second half of the fiscal year, that is to say after 1 January 1949, but I see no reason why contracts cannot be negotiated before that date, providing Norwegian prices, quality for quality, are in line with world market prices.

NOTE TO ANNEX B

Proposed exports from the combined US/UK Zones of Germany to Norway and export possibilities to be investigated for which values cannot yet be assessed.

1. Bleaching earth — Norway is interested in 300 tons and Bizonia hopes to be able to make deliveries later.

2. Refractory bricks — Norway is interested in medium quantities and Bizone hopes to be able to make offers later.

3. Gypsum — The Bizone is offering raw and burnt gypsum for which there may be an interest in Norway later.

4. Monochlorhydrene — Available only on a 1:1 basis against glycerine, Norway will investigate requirements.

5. Generator — Norway is interested in placing an order for a 35,000 KVA generator which the Bizone can deliver by 1952.

- 6. Hemp net line To be supplied on processing basis.
- 7. Cotton yarn Negotiations are in progress.

ANNEX C

Mr. Paul Koht Head of delegation of the Royal Norwegian Government

Dear Mr. Koht:

As stated in Mr. Andrews' letter to you of 1 July 1948, it is the definite intention of the Bizonal food authorities to provide for the purchase of a very substantial amount of Norwegian herring and white fish during the fiscal year 1948-1949.

In view of these assurances, it seems appropriate to Military Governments for Germany (US/UK) that the Norwegian Government give corresponding assurances as to its intentions regarding the disposition of whale oil from the 1949 catch.

I should be glad, therefore, to receive from your Government the formal assurance that, subject to allocation by the International Emergency Food Council, the Royal Norwegian Government will offer to the US/UK Occupied Areas of Germany for purchase by the appropriate purchasing authorities 15,000 tons of whale oil from the 1949 catch.
