Paris, 26 March 1946

Sir,

In the course of the negotiations which have just taken place in Paris, the French and Norwegian delegations agreed to the following provisions:

- (1) France and Norway shall accord to each other treatment as favourable as possible in the reciprocal issue of import and export authorizations.
- (2) With respect to certain products of special interest to the economy of the two countries, it is agreed that for the period from this date until 28 February 1947:
- (a) The French Government shall authorize the export to Norway of the goods specified in schedule A annexed hereto in respect of the quantities or values mentioned therein; the corresponding import licences shall be issued by the Norwegian Government;
- (b) The Norwegian Government shall authorize the export to France of the goods specified in schedule B annexed hereto in respect of the quantities or values mentioned therein; the corresponding import licences shall be issued by the French Government.
- (3) Each Contracting Party undertakes to furnish to the other Party, at the request of that Party, all relevant information concerning the issue of import and export licences.

(4) The two Contracting Parties shall make every effort to facilitate a rapid resumption of commercial exchanges between the two countries and to promote their development. To this end a Joint Commission shall be set up consisting of French representatives and Norwegian representatives whose terms of reference shall be to make all such proposals as are likely to improve the commercial and financial relations between France and Norway.

The said Commission shall also be responsible for supervising the carrying out of the present agreement. It shall meet at the request of the Chairman of either of the two delegations.

I should be glad if you would have the goodness to confirm that the Norwegian Government agrees to the foregoing.
