No. 914. AGREEMENT¹ BETWEEN THE KINGDOM OF DENMARK AND SPAIN CONCERNING THE EXCHANGE OF COMMODITIES. SIGNED AT COPENHAGEN, ON 12 JULY 1950

The Danish Government and the Spanish Government, being desirous of promoting the exchange of commodities between their two countries to the greatest possible extent, have agreed as follows:

Article I

For the purposes of this agreement Denmark shall be deemed to comprise the Kingdom of Denmark including Greenland, and Spain shall be deemed to comprise the peninsular territory of Spain, the Balearic and Canary Isles, the towns of Ceuta and Melilla under Spanish sovereignty, the Spanish protectorate in Morocco and the Spanish colonies.

Article II

The Danish Government undertakes to authorize the export of the Danish commodities specified in schedule D annexed hereto in accordance with the quotas mentioned therein.

The Spanish Government undertakes to authorize the import of such commodities in accordance with the fixed quotas.

The Spanish Government undertakes to authorize the export of the Spanish commodities specified in schedule E annexed hereto in accordance with the quotas mentioned therein.

The Danish Government undertakes to authorize the import of such commodities in accordance with the fixed quotas.

Article III

During the period of validity of this agreement the two Governments may reciprocally grant each other supplementary quotas in addition to those mentioned in schedules D and E.

Article IV

A joint commission of representatives of the two Governments shall be appointed to facilitate the execution of the agreement. The said commission shall meet at the request of either of the two Governments.

Article V

This agreement shall enter into force on 1 July 1950 and shall remain valid for a period of one year. The agreement may be denounced at three months' notice.

Done at Copenhagen, in duplicate, on 12 July 1950.
