No. 967. TRADE AGREEMENT¹ BETWEEN THE KINGDOM OF DENMARK AND THE AUSTRIAN REPUBLIC. SIGNED AT COPENHAGEN, ON 29 NOVEMBER 1948

The Royal Government of Denmark and the Austrian Federal Government, desiring to facilitate and extend trade between the two countries, have agreed as follows:

Article 1

Trade between the two States shall in general conform to lists A and B annexed to this Agreement.

Article 2

The competent authorities of both States shall from time to time issue, in accordance with the import and export regulations in force in both countries, the necessary import and export licences for the goods specified in the lists mentioned in article 1.

Article 3

It is agreed that the goods delivered by the two parties shall be of such value as in general to maintain an economic balance.

Article 4

Payments resulting from trade between the two countries shall be settled in accordance with the provisions of the Payments Agreement² signed this day.

Article 5

Compensation transactions may, if economically necessary, be permitted by leave of the competent authorities of the two countries.

Such compensation transactions may be made with regard both to goods for which reciprocal quotas have been fixed in the annexed lists of goods, and to transactions affecting goods not covered by the reciprocal quotas set forth in those lists.

Article 6

The competent authorities of both countries shall consider favourably applications for approval of processing transactions.

Article 7

Compensation transactions approved by either country before the entry into force of the present Agreement shall be wound up in accordance with the provisions under which they were approved. They shall, however, not be counted against the agreed quotas.

Article 8

The provisions of this Agreement shall continue to apply to transactions approved while it was valid but not wound up at its expiry.

Article 9

A Joint Commission composed of representatives of both Governments shall be set up to supervise the application of this Agreement.

This Commission shall meet from time to time at the request of either Party to this Agreement to propose, on the basis of suggestions made to it, improved measures to the economic relations between the two States and to remove any difficulties that may arise. It shall also be charged with the amendment of this Agreement and of the annexed lists of goods.

Article 10

This Agreement shall come into force on the date of signature and shall remain in force for one year.

Unless this Agreement is denounced by one of the Contracting Parties one month at the latest before the date of its expiry, it shall be deemed to be renewed automatically for successive periods of one year. The two Governments shall if necessary agree to new annual quota lists instead of the lists mentioned in article I.
