No. 1402. TRADE AGREEMENT¹ BETWEEN DENMARK AND PORTUGAL. SIGNED AT LISBON, ON 5 JUNE 1951

The Danish and Portuguese Governments, referring to the Danish-Portuguese Commercial Declaration of 14 December 1896,² and to the Supplementary Declaration of 18 June 1935,³ and desiring to develop trade between their two countries as fully as possible, have agreed on the following provisions:

Article I

The two Governments agree to extend the Trade Agreement of 2 June 1950⁴ for a further period of one year commencing on 1 April 1951 and to replace lists A and B by new lists A₁, B₁, C and D, which are annexed to the present Agreement and shall be valid for the same period.

It is expressly stated that the quotas in lists A₁ and B₁ are not strictly limitative and that the two Governments will endeavour, so far as possible, to expand trade between Denmark and Portugal beyond the stated figures. In lists C and D are enumerated goods which may be freely imported into Denmark or Portugal respectively and the export of which shall be authorized by the exporting countries at least within the quantities or up to the values specified.

Article II

A Joint Commission composed of representatives of the two Governments shall supervise the application of the present Agreement.

It shall also be responsible for making any appropriate suggestions likely to improve trade relations between Denmark and Portugal. It shall meet at the request of the Chairman of either Delegation.

Article III

The present Agreement shall apply, on the one hand, to the entire territory of the Kingdom of Denmark and, on the other hand, to Portugal and the adjacent islands and to the Portuguese territories in Africa.

Article IV

If new free lists should later be published by either Denmark or Portugal, the quotas shown in lists A_1 or B_1 for goods so freed would, of course, be for information only.

Article V

If decisions of the OEEC regarding further freeing of goods from control or the policy of non-discrimination should by their effect on the working of the present Agreement produce consequences that cannot now be foreseen, the Commission provided for in article II shall meet forthwith to consider what steps should be taken in the interest of trade relations between the two countries.

Article VI

The present Agreement shall enter into force on the date of its signature.
