AGREEMENT<sup>1</sup> BETWEEN THE UNITED STATES No. 1758. AMERICA AND THE REPUBLIC OF NICARAGUA OF FOR THE TERMINATION OF THE TRADE AGREEMENT OF 11 MARCH, 1936.<sup>2</sup> SIGNED AT MANAGUA, ON 28 FEBRUARY 1950

The Governments of the United States of America and the Republic of Nicaragua,

Having undertaken tariff negotiations directed toward the accession of the Republic of Nicaragua to the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade,<sup>3</sup>

Hereby agree that the trade agreement between the United States of America and the Republic of Nicaragua, signed at Managua on March 11, 1936,<sup>2</sup> of which certain provisions were terminated by an exchange of notes dated February 8. 1938,<sup>4</sup> shall terminate in its entirety when the Republic of Nicaragua becomes a contracting party to the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade as defined in Article XXXII thereof.<sup>5</sup>

In accordance with the exchange of letters of August 11, 1949 between the Chairmen of the Delegations of the United States of America and the Republic of Nicaragua<sup>6</sup> to the Third Session of the Contracting Parties to the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade, it is agreed that the Nicaraguan Government will not impose any certification requirement or any formality for the importation, registration, licensing and sale of pharmaceutical specialities and patent medicines which are impossible of fulfillment in the United States because of the lack of a duly authorized federal agency. This clause does not affect the obligations assumed by Nicaragua in multilateral treaties and especially those relating to the manufacture and traffic in narcotic drugs, i. e., convention and protocols for the suppression of the abuse of opium and other drugs, signed at The Hague January 23, 1912;<sup>7</sup> international opium convention, signed at Geneva February 19. 1925,<sup>8</sup> and the convention and protocol for limiting the manufacture and regulating the distribution of narcotic drugs, signed at Geneva July 13, 1931.9
