No. 1822. AGREEMENT<sup>1</sup> BETWEEN THE KINGDOM OF DENMARK AND THE REPUBLIC OF POLAND CONCERNING THE EXCHANGE OF GOODS. SIGNED AT WARSAW, ON 9 JUNE 1952

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The Government of the Kingdom of Denmark and the Government of the Republic of Poland, being desirous of developing commercial exchanges between their two countries to the fullest extent possible on a basis of reciprocity, have agreed as follows :

*Article 1*

The two Governments shall grant to each other as favourable treatment as possible in the issue of import and export authorizations.

*Article 2*

The Polish Government shall authorize the export from Poland to Denmark of the goods specified in schedule B annexed hereto, up to the quantities or values laid down for each group of goods.

The relevant import authorizations shall be issued by the Danish Government.

The Danish Government shall authorize the export from Denmark to Poland of the goods in schedule A annexed hereto, up to the quantities or values laid down for each group of goods.

The relevant import authorizations shall be issued by the Polish Government. The schedules mentioned above constitute an integral part of the present agreement.

*Article 3*

The quotas mentioned in schedules A and B shall be valid until 30 November 1952.

The import and export authorizations shall be issued to the persons concerned as soon as possible, special attention being paid to seasonal products.

Even after the schedules mentioned in the first paragraph of the present article have ceased to be valid, the two Governments shall issue export and import authorizations for commercial transactions concluded while the schedules were in force.

#### *Article 4*

The two Governments may by common agreement increase the quotas laid down in schedules A and B and add new quotas of goods thereto either by an exchange of views in the Joint Commission for which provision is made in article 8, or through the diplomatic channel.

#### *Article 5*

The two Governments undertake to make every effort to expedite the conclusion of the contracts for the delivery of the goods mentioned in schedules A and B.

#### *Article 6*

Payments shall be made in accordance with the provisions of the Payments Agreement<sup>1</sup> signed this day.

#### *Article 7*

Settlements shall be permitted only in exceptional circumstances and subject to previous agreement between the competent authorities of the two Governments.

#### *Article 8*

A Joint Commission composed of official representatives of the two countries shall be set up and authorized to supervise the carrying out of this agreement and to settle any disputes and any questions concerning the exchange of commodities and payments that may arise in connexion therewith.

The Commission shall meet at the request of either of the Contracting Parties.

#### *Article 9*

The present agreement shall come into force the day it is signed and shall remain valid until 30 November 1953.

Nevertheless, it shall be extended for a further period of one year, unless it is denounced by one of the Contracting Parties within three months before the date of its expiry, and similarly from year to year.

If the agreement is extended, the Joint Commission shall be responsible for bringing schedules up to date for successive years.
