#### The Secretary of State to the Greek Ambassador

Excellency :

I have the honor to refer to the conversations which have recently taken place between representatives of our two Governments relating to Article III of the Economic Cooperation Agreement between the United States of America and Greece, signed at Athens, on July 2, 1948,<sup>2</sup> as heretofore amended or supplemented.<sup>3</sup> As a consequence of these conversations, the Government of the United States of America proposes the following agreement to the Government of Greece :

The Governments of Greece and of the United States of America will, upon the request of either of them, consult respecting projects in Greece proposed by nationals of the United States of America with regard to which guaranties under Section 111 (b) (3) of the Economic Cooperation Act of 1948, as heretofore amended,<sup>4</sup> have been made or are under consideration. With respect to such guaranties extending to projects which are approved by the Government of Greece in accordance with the provisions of the aforesaid Section, the Government of Greece agrees :

a. That if the Government of the United States of America makes payment in United States dollars to any person under any such guaranty, the Government of Greece will recognize the transfer to the United States

of America of any right, title or interest of such person in assets, currency, credits, or other property on account of which such payment was made and the subrogation of the United States of America to any claim or cause of action of such person arising in connection therewith. The Government of Greece shall also recognize any transfer to the Government of the United States of America pursuant to such guaranty of any compensation for loss covered by such guaranties received from any source other than the Government of the United States of America;

- b. That drachma amounts acquired by the Government of the United States of America pursuant to such guaranties shall be accorded treatment not less favorable than that accorded, at the time of such acquisition, to private funds arising from transactions of United States nationals which are comparable to the transactions covered by such guaranties, and that such drachma amounts will be freely available to the Government of the United States of America for administrative expenditures;
- c. That any claim against the Government of Greece, to which the Government of the United States of America may be subrogated as the result of any payment under such a guaranty, shall be the subject of direct negotiations between the two Governments. If, within a reasonable period, they are unable to settle the claim by agreement, it shall be referred for final and binding determination to a sole arbitrator selected by mutual agreement. If the Governments are unable, within a period of three months, to agree upon such selection, the arbitrator shall be one who may be designated by the President of the International Court of Justice at the request of either Government.

If this proposal is acceptable to the Government of Greece it is suggested that you reply by note. This note, together with such reply, will constitute an agreement between our two Governments on this subject, the agreement to enter into force on the date of receipt of your reply note.

Accept, Excellency, the renewed assurances of my highest consideration.
