No. 7751. LONG-TERM TRADE AGREEMENT¹ BETWEEN THE KINGDOM OF GREECE AND THE POLISH PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC. SIGNED AT ATHENS, ON 30 SEP-TEMBER 1963

The Government of the Kingdom of Greece and the Government of the Polish People's Republic, having found that the development of trade relations between Greece and Poland was favourable and advantageous to the two countries during the period from 1 October 1960 to 30 September 1963 on the basis of the first three-year agreement² and desiring to enjoy the benefits of a new long-term agreement, have agreed as follows :

Article 1

The two Contracting Parties, convinced that possibilities exist for the development of trade between the two countries during the period from 1 October 1963 to 30 September 1966, estimate that the aggregate volume of exports and imports for the three years during which this Agreement is in force should attain the following level :

Detailed schedules shall be drawn up by the two Parties at the time of conclusion of the annual Protocols concerning trade between Greece and Poland. At that time, the Parties shall endeavour to increase the number of products for reciprocal delivery, taking into account, by agreement, not only products which occupy a traditional place in trade between the two countries, but other products also.

Article 2

The two Contracting Parties shall authorize the importation and exportation of the goods enumerated in the schedules in force, in conformity with the general provisions applied in the two countries.

The quota schedules not being restrictive, the competent authorities of the two countries shall give sympathetic consideration to applications for the

importation and exportation of goods in excess of the quantities specified in the schedules or of products not included in the schedules. In the granting of import and export licences, the seasonal character of goods shall be taken into account.

Article 3

Contracts and invoices relating to trade between the two countries shall be respectively concluded and expressed in United States dollars.

Article 4

Goods imported into each of the two countries shall be assigned to domestic consumption in the importing country.

By way of exception, and with the prior consent of the other Contracting Party, such goods may, if necessary, be re-exported to third countries.

Article 5

Payments relating to reciprocal trade shall be effected in accordance with the provisions of the Payments Agreement of 8 November 1960,¹ the term of which is hereby extended until the expiry of the present Long-Term Agreement and which forms an integral part of the present Agreement.

Article 6

The two Contracting Parties shall appoint a Joint Governmental Commission. The Commission shall be responsible for drawing up the annual detailed schedules, supervising the application of this Agreement, and submitting to the two Governments any proposals for improving trade relations between the two countries.

The Joint Commission shall meet at the request of either of the two Parties.

Article 7

This Agreement shall supersede the Long-Term Trade Agreement between the Kingdom of Greece and the Polish People's Republic of 8 November 1960,² the Additional Protocol of 17 December 1962, and the respective annexes.

Article 8

This Agreement shall enter into force on 1 October 1963 and expire on 30 September 1966.

After that date it shall be extended from year to year by tacit agreement unless three months' notice of termination is given.

The provisions of this Agreement shall continue to be applied to transactions which have not been fully carried out by its date of expiry.
