AGREEMENT<sup>1</sup> BETWEEN THE GOVERNMENT OF THE REPUBLIC OF IRELAND AND THE MILITARY GOVERNMENTS FOR THE UNITED STATES, UNITED KINGDOM AND FRENCH OCCUPIED AREAS OF GERMANY COVERING TRADE BETWEEN IRELAND AND THE UNITED STATES, UNITED KINGDOM AND FRENCH OCCUPIED AREAS OF GERMANY. SIGNED AT DUBLIN, ON 22 JULY 1949

Moved by the desire to develop as far as possible trade and commerce between Ireland and the United States, United Kingdom and French Occupied Areas of Germany, the Government of the Republic of Ireland and Military Governments for Germany have agreed as follows:

### Article I

- (a) The Government of the Republic of Ireland shall grant export licences where applicable and Military Governments for Germany (United States, United Kingdom and French) shall grant import licences or otherwise arrange for the deliveries enumerated in the list attached hereto as Annex A, it being understood that this list is not exhaustive and may be enlarged at any time by mutual agreement.
- (b) The Military Governments for Germany (United States, United Kingdom and French) shall grant export licences and the Government of the Republic of Ireland shall grant import licences where applicable for the deliveries enumerated in the list attached hereto as Annex B, it being understood that this list is not exhaustive and may be enlarged at any time, by mutual agreement.
- (c) The licences and arrangements referred to in paragraphs (a) and (b) above shall be subject to the negotiation of contracts which are mutually satisfactory regarding specifications, prices, delivery and other terms.

#### Article II

(a) The Government of the Republic of Ireland shall use their best efforts to promote the exchange of goods and services between Ireland and the United States, United Kingdom and French Occupied Areas of Germany in accordance with the plan envisaged in Article I.

(b) The authorities in the United States, United Kingdom and French Occupied Areas of Germany shall use their best efforts to promote the exchange of goods and services between the United States, United Kingdom and French Occupied Areas of Germany and Ireland in accordance with the plan envisaged in Article I.

## Article III

The parties to this Agreement shall endeavour to encourage contacts between business representatives in order to re-establish the normal exchange of goods and services and to expedite the handling of goods. They shall also grant most-favored-nation treatment with regard to import duties and other levies on goods and services imported from each other.

# Article IV

Payments in respect of trade between Ireland and the United States, United Kingdom and French Occupied Areas of Germany shall be effected in the same manner as payments in respect of trade between the said Occupied Areas and the United Kingdom.

## Article V

The Government of the Republic of Ireland and Military Governments for the United States, United Kingdom and French Occupied Areas of Germany shall consult together at the request of either of them for the purpose of reviewing the operation of this Agreement.

## Article VI

The present Agreement shall take effect as soon as it has been duly signed. It shall remain in effect until 30th June, 1950.

In WITNESS WHEREOF, the Economics Advisors to the Military Governors of the three Western Zones of Germany, acting in the names of the Military Governors and by their authority, and the Plenipotentiary of the Republic of Ireland, have signed the present agreement.

Done in four copies, two in the English language and two in the French language, both texts having equal validity.
