AGREEMENT 1 ON SOCIAL CO-OPERATION BETWEEN THE GOVERNMENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF BRAZIL AND THE GOVERNMENT OF SPAIN

Considering that labour is becoming an increasingly important factor in the national life of our peoples and that their social achievements should be a predominant consideration in the relations between them,

Considering that the protection of the worker is an imperative of the present era and a fundamental human right embodied in our social legislations.

Considering that the problems connected with emigration and settlement are already regulated by the Agreement on Migration between the Government of the United States of Brazil and the Government of the Spanish State, signed at Madrid on 27 December 1960, 2

Considering that our peoples are united by close ties and by enduring bonds of historical tradition, brotherly affection, cultural affinity and a profound social conscience and moral awareness in their achievements in respect of labour,

Considering that the social protection of the worker must be guaranteed in the Ibero-American community of our peoples not only legally through our respective legislations but also through the effective co-operation of social institutions set up for the social advancement of the worker to higher levels of living,

Considering that the conclusion of reciprocal arrangements concerning exchanges and mutual assistance between our peoples could be highly useful in improving our respective social action,

Considering that this reciprocal social co-operation is in keeping with the general agreements and recommendations of international bodies, effectively furthers the social programmes of the international institutions which specialize in social questions and contributes to the efforts of those who work within the Ibero-American community,

The Governments of the United States of Brazil and Spain, represented, respectively, by His Excellency, Mr. Vasco Tristão Leitão da Cunha, Ambassador, Minister for Foreign Affairs of the United States of Brazil, and His Excellency Mr. Arnaldo Sussekind, Minister of Labour and Social Welfare, and by His Excellency Mr. Jesús Romeo Gorría, Minister of Labour of Spain and His Excellency Mr. Jaime Alba, Ambassador of Spain in Brazil

Have agreed as follows:

(A) In respect of technical exchanges:

- 1. To exchange information on the practical experience which they consider of importance for the protection of workers and their families and for furthering their social advancement and raising their level of living.
- 2. To hold periodic meetings of high-ranking leaders in the field of labour and social action in both countries, at which the social achievements of major practical importance may be studied on the spot with a view to the better utilization of each country's experience.

(B) In respect of mutual assistance:

- 1. To co-operate with each other to the greatest extent possible in the training and specialized training of workers, particularly in the training of instructors and the establishment of joint vocational centres for workers of both countries.
- 2. To provide each other with advice with regard to the establishment of or development of social security and social welfare institutions designed to integrate and associate workers with the economic and social development of our countries.
- 3. To grant each other fellowships for advanced vocational training, designed to satisfy the need for skilled manpower resulting from the economic development of our countries.
- 4. To provide each other with technical assistance through special missions which will co-operate with the competent national organs in each country:
- (a) In the planning, execution and extension of social development programmes, particularly programmes concerned with rural action, housing, the creation of employment opportunities, vocational training and social security;
- (b) In national training courses for the personnel of social institutions who will be responsible for the above-mentioned activities.

- (C) In respect of the establishment of a vocational training centre
- 1. To make every effort to establish a vocational training centre in Brazil designed to meet the needs for skilled manpower resulting from the development of the country.
- 2. To facilitate implementation of the foregoing article, the Government of Spain shall grant to the Government of Brazil fellowships, which shall number ten in the current year, for the purpose of training instructors at the vocational training centre. The selection of the fellowship holders shall be the responsibility of the Brazilian authorities.
- 3. For the same purpose as that referred to in the foregoing paragraph, the Government of Spain shall provide the Government of Brazil with the equipment and machinery, specified in the annex hereto, for the functioning of the vocational training centre and shall give advice on its installation and entry into operation.

The administrative regulations necessary for applying the principles laid down in this Agreement shall be established by mutual agreement.

This Agreement shall be ratified as soon as the legal formalities customary in the territory of each of the High Contracting Parties have been complied with.

It shall enter into force on the date of exchange of the instruments of ratification and shall remain in force until it is denounced by either High Contracting Party, after one year's notice.

The exchange of the instruments of ratification shall take place in the city of Rio de Janeiro as soon as possible.

In WITNESS WHEREOF the above-mentioned plenipotentiaries have signed this Agreement in two copies, both in the Portuguese and Spanish languages, and have thereto affixed their seals.

Done in the city of Rio de Janeiro, on the eleventh day of August, one thousand nine hundred and sixty-four.
