The Ambassador of the United States of America presents his compliments to His Excellency the Secretary of State for External Affairs and with reference to the meeting at Ottawa on May 31, 1951 between representatives of the Royal Canadian Air Force and the United States Air Force to discuss the re-supply of the joint Canadian-United States Arctic Weather Stations, has the honor to request that the Department of External Affairs confirm the Canadian Government's approval of the following understandings which the Department of State has been informed by the United States Air Force were reached at this meeting:

- (1) Both the United States Air Force and Royal Canadian Air Force are to participate, on an equitable basis, in the air supply of all joint Canadian-United States Weather Stations.
- (2) The Royal Canadian Air Force is to exercise operational control over all air supply operations out of Resolute.
- (3) The United States Air Force is to exercise operational control over all air supply operations out of Thule.

The United States Air Force was represented at the Ottawa meeting by the Northeast Air Command. It is understood that the senior representative of the Royal Canadian Air Force was Wing Commander R. I. Thomas, R.C.A.F.
