AGREEMENT¹ RELATING TO THE ABOLITION OF VISAS BETWEEN ISRAEL AND THE REPUBLIC OF SAN MARINO

Article 1. Nationals of San Marino who possess a valid national passport may enter Israel by whatever route and from whatever country, and remain there for a maximum period of 90 days, without being required to obtain an entry visa in advance.

Article 2. Israeli nationals who possess a valid national passport may enter San Marino by whatever route and from whatever country, and remain there for a maximum period of 90 days without being required to obtain an entry visa in advance.

Article 3. Before departing for Israel, nationals of San Marino who desire to remain in Israel for a period longer than 90 days must obtain a visa from the competent diplomatic or consular authorities of Israel, in conformity with the provisions in force.

Article 4. Before departing for San Marino, Israeli nationals who desire to remain in San Marino for a period longer than 90 days must obtain a visa from the competent diplomatic or consular authorities of San Marino, in conformity with the provisions in force.

Article 5. It is understood that the abolition of entry visas does not exempt nationals of San Marino and Israel who are travelling to Israel and San Marino respectively from the obligation to obey the local laws and regulations concerning foreigners, both as regards entry and stay in the country and as regards the authorization to engage in a dependent and remuneration labour activity.

Article 6. It is also understood that the abolition of visas envisaged in this Agreement also eliminates the requirement to obtain a laissez-passer and to submit to any formalities in order to leave the country, in the agreed period of time of 90 days.

Article 7. The competent authorities of San Marino and Israel reserve the right to refuse entry into their respective territories to any person of the other country considered to be undesirable.

Article 8. Nationals of San Marino staying in Israel may leave Israel temporarily for a maximum period of 90 days and return to Israel without having to obtain a return visa.

Article 9. Nationals of Israel staying in San Marino may leave San Marino temporarily for a maximum period of 90 days and return to San Marino without having to obtain a return visa.

Article 10. For reasons of public order, each of the two Governments may temporarily suspend, totally or partially, the application of these provisions. Immediate notification of such suspension shall be given to the other party through the diplomatic channel.

Article 11. This Agreement shall enter into force from the date of its signature and may be denounced by either of the two Governments on three months' notice.

DONE at San Marino, on 16 May 1977, in two copies in Hebrew and Italian, the two texts being equally authentic.
